2015 Report of the RSNA News Editorial Board

RSNA News remains dedicated to its mission of providing the RSNA membership with timely, interesting articles about important events, people, and scientific discoveries, using a variety of media to accommodate different user preferences.

Broad Range of News Coverage

In 2015 RSNA News remained a premier source of news about radiologic science, technology, education, and research, as well as legal and health policy issues. A full list of feature articles published in RSNA News from December 2014 to November 2015 follows this report.

Hot Topics—Features on radiology's critical issues explored topics including cost barriers to CT lung cancer screening programs and 3-D printing technology in imaging centers. Also covered were the impending transition to ICD-10, the potential effects of the SGR repeal to radiology reimbursement, and whether a value-based payment model is the future for radiologists.

Technology—The magazine strives to help readers keep pace with technological developments in exam room, reading room and beyond. Articles in 2015 included reports on a promising robotic system for CT-guided biopsies of lung lesions, structured reporting technology that makes radiology reports easier to create, and business analytics tools to help radiologists run their practices.

Research—RSNA News kept readers on the cutting edge with articles on such topics as using Diffusion Tensor Imaging to detect physiological changes in skeletal muscle after long-distance running, multiphase CT showing promise for stroke patients, MRI research revealing infants' patterns of pain-related brain activity, and diffusion-weighted MR of the cervix in managing preterm labor.

Global Issues—Committed to helping readers understand the state of the radiology specialty around the world, RSNA News reported on the impact of RSNA's international programs and strived to increase members' awareness of global radiology needs.

As always, *RSNA News* maintains its commitment to promoting RSNA programs and member benefits, including comprehensive coverage of the annual meeting and articles on RSNA Research & Education Foundation funding and successful grant outcomes, new online features offered by the RSNA journals and the *RadiologyInfo.org* patient information website.

"Digital First" Approach

Results from the *RSNA News* readership survey in 2014 showed an increasing percentage of readers are consuming the magazine in its digital form. With that in mind, the *RSNA News* Editorial Board works with staff to continuously enhance the online version of the magazine. In 2015 *RSNA News* launched our "digital first" strategy, whereby stories and announcements go online first, with the print publication becoming a curation of online content and more in-depth pieces. The goal is to capitalize on the unique advantages of each medium for the optimum benefit of *RSNA News* readers.

At the same time, Web pages are being redesigned to be more engaging and allow easier navigation between stories and issues of the magazine. Web designers also continue to optimize the experience for those reading *RSNA News* on a smartphone or tablet.
